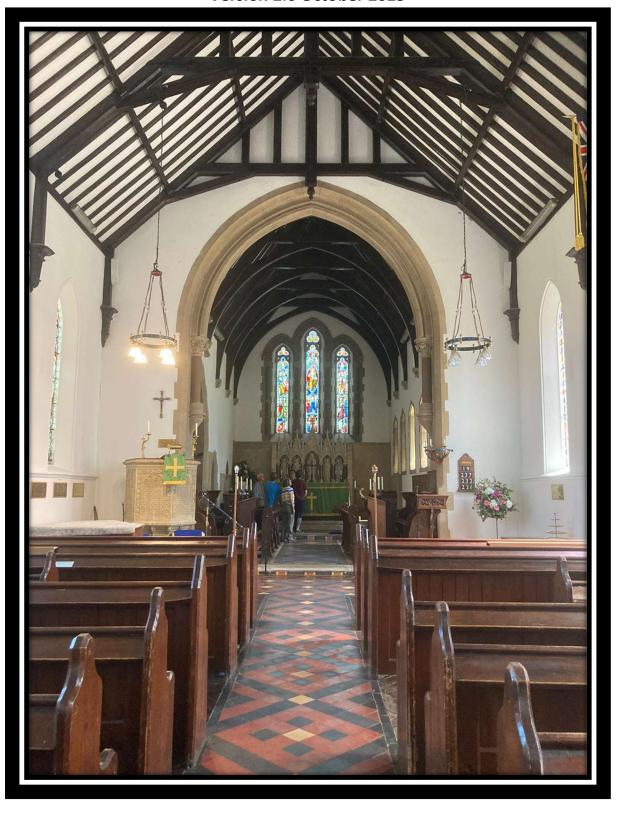
EYE & DUNSDEN NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN CONSULTATION STATEMENT

Version 2.0 October 2025



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1. INTRODUCTION

This Consultation Statement has been prepared to fulfil the legal obligations of the Neighbourhood Planning Regulations 2012. It has been prepared by Eye & Dunsden Steering Committee on behalf of Eye & Dunsden Parish Council, with support from South Oxfordshire District Council (SODC); Thames Valley Environmental Records Centre (TVERC), FutureNature WTC, landscape architect Liz Allen and Bluestone Planning LLP consultants to the Parish Council.

Section 15(2) of Part 5 of the Regulations sets out that a Consultation Statement should contain:

- (a) details of the persons and bodies who were consulted about the proposed neighbourhood development plan;
- (b) an explanation of how the community were consulted;
- (c) a summary of the main issues and concerns raised by the persons consulted; and
- (d) a description of how these issues and concerns have been considered and, where relevant, addressed in the proposed neighbourhood development plan.

The contents of this Consultation Statement are intended to meet the requirements of the Regulations.

2. AIMS OF THE CONSULTATION

The aims of the Eye & Dunsden Neighbourhood Plan (the Plan) consultation were:

- To involve as much of the community as possible throughout all consultation stages of the Plan development so that the Plan was informed by the views of local people and other stakeholders from the start of the Neighbourhood Planning process;
- To ensure that consultation events took place at critical points in the process where decisions needed to be taken;
- To engage with as wide a range of people as possible, using a variety of approaches and communication and consultation techniques; and
- To ensure that results of consultation were fed back to local people and available to read (in both hard copy and via the Neighbourhood Plan page on the Parish website) as soon as possible after the consultation events.

In preparing the Plan, the Steering Committee have consulted residents, local businesses, SODC and other interested parties. Further details of consultations are itemised in detailed in section 4 of this Statement.

3. BACKGROUND

3.1 The Designated Neighbourhood Plan Area

The Eye & Dunsden Neighbourhood Plan area encompasses the whole of Eye & Dunsden Parish. For planning purposes, Eye & Dunsden Parish is covered by South Oxfordshire District Council (SODC). It is a largely rural civil parish, bordering the River Thames, in the most southern part of the English county of Oxfordshire and has a population of around 421 residents and 160 residences, mainly in three settlement areas, Sonning Eye, Playhatch and Dunsden Green. SODC have formally confirmed the Plan Area.

3.2. Initiation Of Neighbourhood Planning

To ensure that any future development took place in keeping with the needs of the community, albeit within the framework established by the local plans, work was initiated in 2019 on a neighbourhood plan for Eye & Dunsden Parish.

In conjunction with representatives from SODC and arranged by the Parish Council a meeting took place in Dunsden Village Hall in October 2019 to discuss the purpose and potential benefit of neighbourhood plans and to call for the involvement of volunteers.

As a result of this meeting, a Steering Committee made up of residents from all three settlement areas together with some Parish Councillors started work developing the plan.

4. CONSULTATIVE PROCESS

4.1 Summary

Throughout the creation of the Neighbourhood Plan, the Parish Council have updated residents of progress via a full community engagement process which included communication on a dedicated Facebook page, a dedicated Twitter

account, a page on the Parish Council website and monthly NDP focused newsletters. Minutes of the Steering Committee have been made available on the website as have the results of surveys and other important documents.

A number of Parish-wide surveys were conducted to maximise participation and collate as much information from the residents as possible to help shape the direction of the Neighbourhood Plan. The surveys were conducted by the Steering Committee both using hard and soft copies to ensure accessibility to all. Hard copies were made available via either availability at events or by delivery to households while soft copies were emailed to individuals who had provided their email addresses and confirmed their desire to be contacted in this way. The exception was the Housing Survey which was delivered to every household in the Parish by hand.

The main Parish wide surveys involving the residents were as follows:

- A residents survey conducted in March 2020 to gather views and opinions on what people liked and disliked about living in Eye & Dunsden Parish, what was important to them and how they would like to see it develop. Results shown in Appendix 1.
- An email campaign commencing in November 2020 requesting the response to a short questionnaire from local businesses.
- An open day and Neighbourhood Plan exhibition took place in the Village Hall on 30th August 2021 to discuss vision, aims, objectives and the developing plan. Members of the Steering Committee were available to answer any questions. A questionnaire was handed to each attendee at the event seeking opinions on the various aspects of the draft Neighbourhood Plan. The questionnaire was circulated after the event to individuals whose details were on the NDP distribution list. Results shown in Appendix 2.
- A Housing Needs Survey followed in October 2021, a paper form was delivered by post to every residence regarding housing needs in the Parish Results shown in Appendix 3.
- Members of the Steering Committee were present at the Parish Fireworks in November 2023, alongside a number of exhibition stands setting out details of the draft NDP, to answer any queries posed by residents attending the event.
- The statutory pre-submission consultation stage in accordance with Regulation 14 took place from 1st December 2023 to 12th January 2024. An email (including a link to the Plan and associated documents) was sent to all residents in the Parish, individuals who had requested inclusion on the Distribution List and Statutory bodies (as advised by SODC). Hard copies of the Plan and associated documents were made available to residents at The Mill at Sonning, The Crown at Playhatch and Loddon Brewery. Again,

- responses could be made using a standardised Comments Form and submitted, either by email or by post to the Parish Clerk.
- On the subsequent advice of the Planning Authority, in April 2025 a specific consultation was undertaken with owners of land proposed to be designated as Local Green Spaces with the draft NDP, each of whom received a letter from the Steering Committee inviting their specific comments.

4.2 Parish-wide Consultations

4.2.1 NDP Community Questionnaire #1 May 2020

The purpose of the 2020 survey was to understand residents' views on further housing development and how they would like to see the Parish evolve.

The survey was designed by the Eye & Dunsden Neighbourhood Plan Steering Committee and copies of a questionnaire were printed and hand delivered to every residential property in the Parish, which is approximately 130 residences in total.

Completed forms were returned to the Parish Clerk although the vast majority were completed on-line. Nearly 57 responses were received i.e. 38 % of households (assuming one response per household).

4.2.2 Business Questionnaire 2020

Within Eye & Dunsden Parish, there are approximately 30-40 businesses, which are a mixture of branches of large companies (eg Travis Perkins), smaller local businesses (eg Isis Waterskiing) and sole traders. These businesses were contacted in November 2020, then again in January 2021 and asked to complete a short questionnaire asking them to identify their issues and aspirations as a business within the Parish.

The questions asked were:

- What aspects of working/running a business in Eye & Dunsden benefit your business?
- What aspects of the Parish/area resulted in you setting up your business here?
- What issues within the Parish concern you or impact your business?
- Any other comments in particular on landscape, transportation or environmental issues.

Five businesses responded with comments. A further ten responded acknowledging the emails.

Businesses were subsequently invited to an on-line meeting (due to the limitations of COVID) to discuss the results of the questions and to assist the Steering Group in further understanding their requirements and how these could be reflected and/or accommodated in the Neighbourhood Plan

4.2.3 Informal Consultation Event - 30 August 2021

To seek residents feedback on the draft policies and proposed direction of the Neighbourhood Plan as well as to enhance resident engagement in the design and development of the Neighbourhood Plan, an open day and exhibition took place at Dunsden Village Hall on Monday 30th August 2021. At this event, refreshments and a bouncy castle were provided to assist in increasing resident engagement.

Exhibition stands were designed and produced detailing the focus areas of the proposed Neighbourhood Plan as well as detailing the process, the timetable and the supporting evidence that was being collected to support the policies (see photos below). The members of the Steering Committee were available to talk to attendees as well as to answer any questions that they had regarding the information being shared.

52 members of the public attended the event, all of whom were handed a questionnaire to complete as they walked around the exhibition. 29 completed questionnaires were handed in, the majority of which had been completed by the household rather than the individual (hence the disparity between the number of completed questionnaires and attendees). The responses (together with the questions asked) are set out in Appendix 2.

4.2.4 Housing Needs Survey

A Housing Needs survey was undertaken in October 2021 by the Steering Committee. The purpose of the survey was to identify local residents' housing needs for the next five years or more. The Steering Committee delivered a questionnaire to every household in the Parish.

A total of 10 questionnaires were returned, a response rate calculated at approximately 6%.

The final report was produced by the Steering Committee in October 2021 and the results can be found at Appendix 3 to this report.

4.2.5 Regulation 14 Pre-submission consultation

The Pre-submission consultation for the draft of the Eye & Dunsden Neighbourhood Plan and associated documentation was held from 1st December 2023 to 12th January 2024.

The Consultation was conducted online and promoted via Facebook, the Parish website and posters on the Parish notice boards and were sent to the required statutory consultees (as advised by SODC - see Section 6.1 for list), local businesses (see Section 6.2 for list) and all residents in the NDP area as well as additional individuals/households who had signed up and/or requested to receive details of the Consultation. Hard copies of the Plan and associated documents were made available to residents at The Mill at Sonning, The Crown at Playhatch and Loddon Brewery

A total of 15 responses were received as on-line returns using a Survey Monkey form, attachments to the form or separate letters and emails. These responses came from residents of Eye & Dunsden including local landowners, landowners from outside the Parish or their agents, representatives of organisations operating within the Parish and statutory consultees.

Responses in terms of numbers received were as follows:

- 3 from residents of the Parish
- 6 from statutory consultees
- 4 from agents for landowners/developers
- 2 from owners of land in the Parish but resident outside; and
- 0 from organisations operating in the Parish

Apart from general comments, there were a number of detailed comments on the text of the Pre-submission draft.

The responses and comments received were logged. The Steering Committee then reviewed all comments and decided upon their response, being either:

- Disagreed with reasons for their disagreement
- Agreed in principle or in part and if so, what amendments should be made to the draft Plan
- Agreed in full and the amendments to be made to the draft Plan

To view all comments received (précised where too lengthy to reproduce), the response by the Steering Committee and any amendments made to the draft Plan see Appendix 4.

4.3 Specific Consultation Re: Potential Local Green Spaces

Following the conclusion of the Regulation 14 process, the Steering Committee was advised by SODC to inform the owners of land proposed to be designated as a Local Green Space in the Neighbourhood Plan of this intention. This exercise was undertaken in March 2025 and the comments received from the landowners were reviewed. The Local Green Space Assessment was then reviewed and amended. Responses to these additional comments are included in the tables at Appendix 4.

4.4 Miscellaneous Communication

During the NDP process a number of miscellaneous interactions took place which have been considered in the preparation and amendment of the Neighbourhood Plan. These include:

- A meeting took place with Tarmac (the contractor mining aggregates from the Thames flood plain at Sonning and a significant local business) in August 2021 to discuss biodiversity surveys of the lake etc etc. Stantec, on behalf of Tarmac, also responded to the questionnaire issued at the informal consultation in August 2021 (see 4.2.1)
- A number of conversations took place with a specific local resident (ref 598) in relation to LGS designation. The resident was invited to and attended an NDP Steering Group meeting. Comments and representations made were considered in re-appraising the LGS Assessment.

Detailed comments were provided by a further resident regarding LGS designation in February 2025 (more than 12 months after the Regulation 14 consultation closed). These too have been considered in the re-appraisal of the LGS Assessment

4.5 Meeting the Statutory Requirement

In the preparation of the Eye & Dunsden Neighbourhood Plan, residents and business owners have been encouraged to comment and raises issues or concerns through responding to surveys, messaging the Steering Group via email, responding via Facebook or submitting their comments via the Parish Council.

All statutory requirements (as referred to above) have been met and additional consultation, engagement, and research has been completed. This Consultation Statement has been produced to document the consultation and engagement process undertaken and is considered to comply with Part 5, Section 15 of the Neighbourhood Planning (General) Regulations 2012.

5 COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT PROGRAMME

5.1 Community Engagement Events

In addition to the communication provided for residents, the Steering Group planned and delivered a series of events intended to create engagement within the local residents by building their knowledge of the Parish, its history, its architecture and its biodiversity.

5.2 Additional Community Engagement Activities

5.2.1 MONTHLY NEWSLETTERS

A series of newsletters in support of the Neighbourhood Plan process was designed, produced and circulated between November 2020 and April 2023. These newsletters were emailed to all individuals who had signed up to receive information on the Neighbourhood Plan (including Parish residents) and local businesses. Copies were posted to those individuals who had not provided an email address. A copy of each newsletter was also displayed on the noticeboard of each village.

The newsletters contained information about aspects of the Neighbourhood Plan eg details on what a Local Green Space was or how the Referendum would work) as well as inviting comment or suggestions from recipients. In particular, recipients were asked to nominate properties, structures or even trees which they felt should be included in the Neighbourhood Plan so they could be afforded necessary protection or recognition of their importance.

5.2.2 FACEBOOK

A dedicated Facebook page for the Neighbourhood Plan was set up in 2020 to enable information about the Neighbourhood Plan to be shared with followers online. Details of community engagement events (eg walks etc) were shared to ensure that the invitation to join was as accessible as possible and went as far as possible.

Information on the progress was also shared on the page, rounding off with details of the Regulation 14 process showing followers where they could find the Neighbourhood Plan and attachments within the Parish.

While the newsletters were not shared on Facebook, some of the information or invitations included in them was also used as the basis for a post on the Facebook page.

5.2.3 TWITTER

Following a similar ethos to the establishment of the Facebook page, a Twitter (now X) account was set up to share details of the Community Engagement events.

Both the Twitter page and the Facebook page followed a number of other associated pages in the area to insure more connectivity between the committee and the various projects already taking place in the community.

5.2.4 PRE-REGULATION 14 LEAFLET

The Steering Committee produced a tri-fold coloured leaflet setting out useful information on the Neighbourhood Plan, some details about the contents of the Plan as well as guidance on the forthcoming Regulation 14 process.

Focus areas set out in the leaflet were:

- What is an NDP?
- What stage are we at now?
- What happens next?
- Approximate timetable
- Why do you need to be involved?
- Where can I see the Neighbourhood Development Plan and Evidence base?
- How can I have my say?
- List of policies
- Community Aspirations
- Our Vision
- What we have found out
- The NDP
- Landscape Assessment
- Settlement Character
- The Environment
- Connectivity

This leaflet was delivered by hand to each household in the Parish in November 2024.

5.2.5 Eye & Dunsden Parish Website

A dedicated page focusing on the Neighbourhood Plan was set up on the Eye & Dunsden Parish website (www.eyedunsden.org). Throughout the process, updates have been posted regularly to keep residents and interested parties updated. In addition, the Minutes from each meeting of the Steering Committee have been shared on-line to ensure full transparency on the contents and focus of each meeting.

This page and site were instrumental in providing virtual access to the Neighbourhood Plan and Evidence Base documents to residents and interested parties during the Regulation 14 process.

6. REGULATION 14 CONSULTATION -

The Pre-submission consultation for the draft of the Eye & Dunsden Neighbourhood Plan and associated documentation was held from 1st December 2023 to 12th January 2024.

The Consultation was conducted online and promoted via Facebook, the Parish website and posters on the Parish notice boards and was sent to the required statutory consultees (33 in total), local businesses and organisations (83 in total) as well as all residents in the NDP area and additional individuals/households who had signed up and/or requested to receive details of the Consultation. There was a total of 849 individuals in this distribution group. Details of the regulatory organisations and the local businesses and organisations are set out below. Hard

copies of the Plan and associated documents were made available to residents at The Mill at Sonning, The Crown at Playhatch and Loddon Brewery.

The list of statutory consultees was provided to the Steering Committee by the Planning Authority. Local businesses and organisations were included in the list either due to their presence in the Neighbourhood Plan area or because they had requested to be added to the distribution list.

The list of individuals was created from the distribution list provided by the Parish Council of individuals who had signed up to receive information from the Parish Council relevant to the locality. This was developed by adding in those people who specifically asked to receive information about the Neighbourhood Plan either via email, sign-up or in person at one of the Community Engagement events.

APPENDIX 1

NDP COMMUNITY QUESTIONNAIRE #1 MAY 2020

Timeframe & format:

A paper questionnaire & pre-paid return envelope was delivered to residents in May 2020. Responses were received between May and the end of July. The majority were returned via the paper copy, but a small number (5) were received online via the SurveyMonkey platform. Analysis of final results was completed in August 2020.

The survey was specifically designed to be short, engaging and open, to encourage maximum participation. An earlier version of the survey was trialled by the NDP working group and it was reviewed and amended based on feedback from this group as well as xx SODC. To enable a degree of analysis, a broad list of responses was provided so respondents could quickly tick and complete, however every question had an open-ended free text answer to capture anything else that respondents wished to share. Respondents could tick all responses that applied and there was no need to rank by importance. 60% of respondents made additional free-text comments.

The questions in the survey were:

- 1 What aspects of living in Eye & Dunsden do you particularly enjoy? (please tick all that apply). Open question: please be more specific if you can
- 2 What issues affecting the Parish are you concerned about? (please tick all that apply). Open question: other aspects that concern you
- 3 How would you like to be involved (please tick all that apply). Open question: other ways I'd like to get involved please specify
- 4 Your details and any other comments

Promotion:

The Parish Council and NDP sub-site advertised the questionnaire and encouraged responses. Leaflets were posted on public noticeboards throughout the Parish. Large posters were put up in prominent places, such as the side of bus shelters and on the Green in Dunsden.

Response volume & distribution:

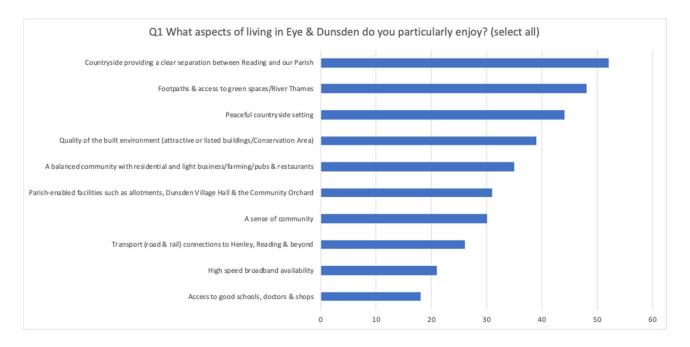
Of 149 surveys dispatched to Parish residents, 57 were completed and returned. 5 via the SurveyMonkey online tool, 52 on paper. This gives a 38% response rate on the 149 surveys dispatched. This is a strong achievement given the average expected response rate for a survey of this type of 10-15% and shows strong community engagement.

Response volumes were evenly spread between the three distinct areas within the Parish, with just 5 responses (9%) completed anonymously.

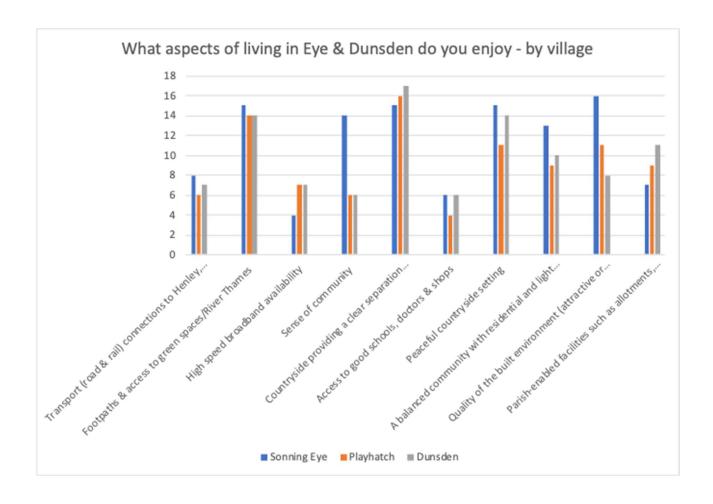

Results & analysis:

In terms of the aspects that residents most enjoy, it is clear that these were related to the countryside setting, providing a peaceful environment with access to the countryside. Access to amenities (schools, shops, doctors, broadband, transport) scored much lower.



Looking at this question by the 3 distinct areas within the Parish (Dunsden; Playhatch; Sonning Eye) it is clear that Dunsden & Playhatch respondents answer pretty similarly, but there are some distinct differences in responses from Sonning Eye. Most noticeably Sonning Eye residents highly ranked 'a sense of community' as an enjoyable aspect but it was one of the lowest ranked features in the other 2 areas. Sonning Eye residents also ranked quality of the built environment and a balanced community more highly. It's likely that the Sonning Eye Conservation Area and large number of listed buildings make a difference to residents' views.



Here is a selection of the free text responses that accompanied this question:

[&]quot;The peace and beauty of the countryside. And we should do all we can to protect these qualities"

[&]quot;The way that South Oxfordshire has managed to preserve its rural identity"

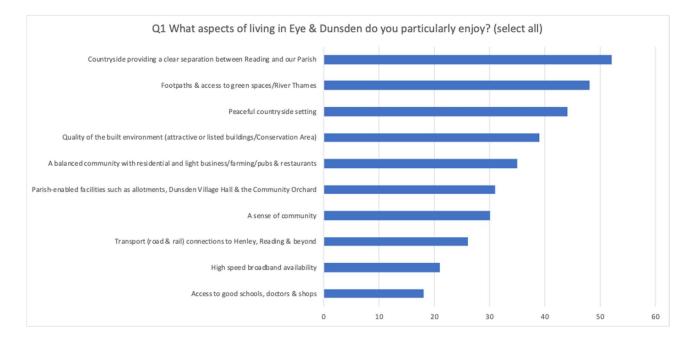
[&]quot;It's a great place to live: well-situated with some brilliant facilities. But I feel it's threatened and that we need to work together to keep it as good as it is."

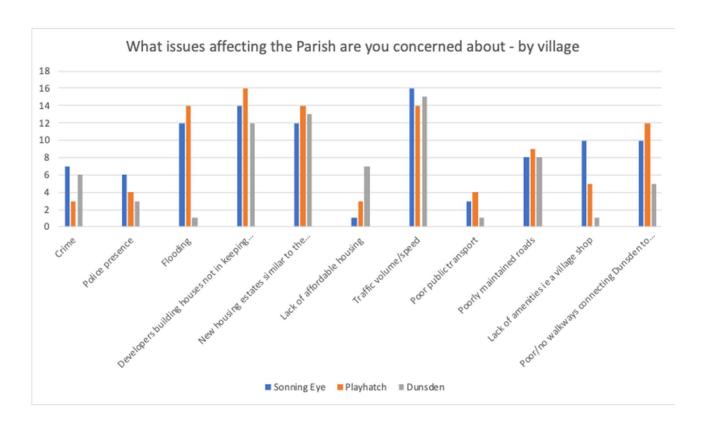
"The residents are respectful, caring and decent people which adds more value and uplifts our quality of life"

The issues that residents were most concerned about are divided into three distinct categories:

- At the top of respondents' concerns are traffic volume & speed (highlighted by 88% of respondents), and issues related to housing developments
- Middle ranking in terms of concerns is flooding & connectivity (poor roads & footpaths), but these were still mentioned by approx. 50% of respondents
- Causing least concern are a range of possible issues such as police presence and crime, indicating that respondents feel that the Parish is relatively crimefree. Other issues in this bracket indicate residents are not particularly concerned about public transport, a village shop or affordable housing



Looking at the results to this question by sub area we see a more universal spread of responses indicating little difference in feelings between the areas. Clearly Flooding is not an issue that affects Dunsden Green residents, being located up a hill. Interestingly, the lack of a village shop is not seen as an issue for Dunsden residents, but Sonning Eye, where community spirit is much stronger, feels that the lack of village amenities is an issue. Dunsden residents do have the benefit of a well run and popular village store & post office in Binfield Heath so this probably explains why the lack of a village store is less relevant to Dunsden residents.



To bring this question to life, here is a sample of the free text responses to this question:

"Better protection for cyclists is important to me (cycle lanes or routes, including on the river between Sonning and Shiplake) and I'd like to see only small scale development that was discreet, on small sites that are appropriate infill and is affordable and in keeping with the local vernacular. We should also ensure that it has the minimum impact on climate change"

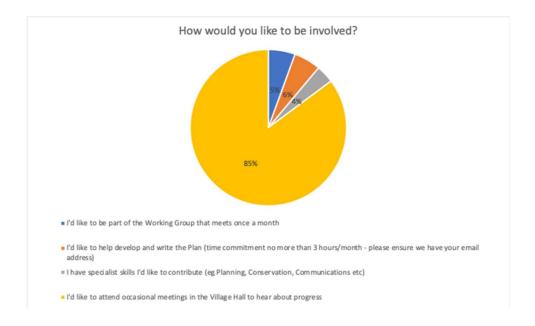
"Over development - new property detracts & diminishes the area"

Involvement in the NDP process produced the expected response, with 85% happy to hear about progress but not necessarily wishing to spend time on a more regular basis! That said, we have a working group of approx. 22 local residents, representing 14% of Eye & Dunsden households.

[&]quot;Lack of genuine concern by OCC/SODC to flood risk in Sonning Eye"

[&]quot;The roads are not designed for rat run traffic so a new development bothers me."

[&]quot;I do not feel that safe walking along the road out of lockdown times"



Next steps: these results have been reviewed and agreed/amended by the NDP working group, are being used as input for the development of policies and will be added to the appendix. It is likely that a follow up questionnaire will be required as the NDP process proceeds.

However, in order to hear the views of the residents on this particular matter, a very brief survey has been conducted the results of which are summarised below. A statistical analysis is not considered relevant on such a small sample size and may in fact be misleading.

A total of ten surveys were returned which represents under 10% of the households within the Parish. Unfortunately, this is not representative of the response to the recent public presentation of NDP progress.

NOTICE AND COLLECTION
